The Roadmap is a user-friendly web-based tool that will guide practitioners through the process required to develop and implement a Programmatic Agreement. The Roadmap provides relevant examples of successes and challenges at key decision points, as well as highlights successful strategies for establishing Programmatic Agreements, including common phrasing/clauses, scope, and structure.



Building on the FHWA and Volpe National Transportation Systems Center: Benefits and Costs of Programmatic Agreements report, the Tracking Tool provides a user-friendly, easily-accessible webbased template for state DOTs to clearly and concisely track the short- and long-term benefits of developing and implementing Programmatic Agreements. The tool tracks both non-recurring (one-time or start-up) costs and recurring (ongoing) costs associated with implementing, maintaining, and updating a Programmatic Agreement. The tool also tracks both quantitative benefits (shortened project timelines, reduced mitigation costs, redirected staff time, etc.) and qualitative measures (increased level of predictability/certainty and better relationships between the FHWA, DOT, and/or the other state and federal agencies).
